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Helping the Community: Adoption News

BARK's New Saturday Adoption Site - Saturdays Only

Our Saturday adoption outings have moved from PetSmart in Short Pump to the Jessica Beath Clinic at the Farrington Firehouse (12300 Farrington Rd, Ashland). This change is a result of new policies put in place by PetSmart that will greatly affect our ability to showcase the dogs on Saturdays. PetSmart's new regulations prohibit outside adoption outings when the weather is below 50 degrees or above 90 degrees (which it will be very soon). In addition to being restricted to inside the store, PetSmart has notified BARK that we can only walk dogs in half of the store because another rescue group on site will be walking dogs in the other half of the store. Since Saturday is our busiest day for adoptions with 12-15 dogs routinely brought out to be seen, the new restrictions raise some important safety concerns (too many unfamiliar dogs in too small of an area and very young children attempting to walk dogs unsupervised). The spay/neuter clinic is air conditioned, has a kitchen, community room and bathroom, and gives BARK plenty of room to promote adoptable dogs in a safe manner. Currently, adoption outings will only be held on Saturdays until further notice.

Most BARK dogs are rescued from local public shelters. These shelters are open admission facilities, meaning that they are required by law to accept all unwanted dogs, such as those picked up as strays or surrendered by owners. When public shelters run out of room to house the dogs, they sometimes euthanize as a means of population control.

BARK and other rescue groups offer lifesaving alternatives by transferring at risk dogs to their facilities, where they are housed until adoptive homes are found. In addition to finding forever homes, BARK vaccinates, spays/neuters each dog and provides appropriate veterinary care.

We are proud to report that **34** dogs found loving homes in December including Roscoe, Kaison, and Brandy from our Oldies but Goodies program. If you'd like to keep up with the dogs adopted each week, please become a fan of BARK on Facebook at www.facebook.com/barkva.

“Titus is a very active big boy,” says his volunteer friend. “He loves to play ball and Frisbee. After all of the BARK dogs have been put back in their kennels, I take Titus out by himself to play. He is so well behaved. He doesn't pay attention to other people or dogs- his entire focus is on the Frisbee. Therefore, I don't even need to take him out of the kennel building on a leash, he just follows me and the Frisbee right along. This boy loves to play and will go back and forth with his ball or Frisbee forever. He fetches and brings the toy back to me and lays it down after he chews on it a minute or so and then waits expectantly for the next throw. When I have to leave, I pick up the Frisbee and head for the kennel. Titus knows the signal and runs in front of me and goes directly into his kennel without leash or other encouragement. Not only does he fetch, he has the lean body and long legs of a runner. If you are training or enjoy a daily jog, Titus would like to be right there with you.”

Titus is a young 6-1/2 years, and weighs a lean 69 pounds. He is ok with cats and once even rescued a small flock of hens from an evil fox and coyote who were up to no good. He is easily entertained and enjoy chasing leaves and shadows. He does best walking with a gentle leader but even better jogging! After exercise, he just wants to be a lap dog. He loves to lean on you when you are standing and will gladly climb onto your lap if you let him. Titus dislikes garden hoses, sprinklers and/or spraying water. FARM DOGGIES NEED MORE HOUSEKEEPERS and FRIENDS!!!

It may seem like we are always looking for additional volunteers and you know what? We are. People come and go, so we are in a constant state of finding additional volunteers. As it stands there are not enough of us to go around much less cover for one another during illnesses, vacations... The dogs must be taken care of properly on a daily basis and that task falls upon us, you, those who care about saving the lives of innocent homeless animals. We brought them to BARK so they are ours to care for. Right now we have two, occasionally three, volunteers on a certain day who clean the front **and** back buildings as well as the Intake. That is just way, way too much for anyone. But they are diehards and have been here for a good number of years. They just keep on keeping on hoping for additional volunteers. That pace causes TOTAL BURN OUT and we can't afford to lose our diehard volunteers. We need you to make a commitment to help clean kennels once a week or maybe alternate with someone for every other week. The kennels get cleaned every day, 7 days a week; Wish they got cleaned twice but once is hard enough. We are the highlight in the lives of these dogs and their best friends. They Need Us! With the constant change of schedules and the juggling of jobs and children and "LIFE", we are constantly looking to replace volunteers. The regular long term kennel keepers who clean the kennels and care for the dogs find themselves needing more cleaners. We have walkers, but not so many cleaners. So if you can spare some time, enough to do even just 4-6 kennels, once a week or so, please call Linda at 883-7740 and we'll welcome you with open arms.

Volunteer Groups

The good news is that we have so many new and wonderful groups volunteering. The not so good news is that sometimes too many show up at the same time. So, all groups must be scheduled before they can visit the farm (experienced or not) to walk and/or help take care of the kennels. We are limiting the number of visiting groups on any one day for the safety of all. Please contact Carol Murray at murrsan@verizon.net to arrange a date.

Current Schedule for Kennel and Dog Care

Our flexible work schedule has proven a success. It allows volunteers, once they are trained, to clean any time during the day on which they have enlisted. Only experienced volunteers can come alone. Grab a friend or family member if you are new or come at a time while other volunteers are there. Volunteers are there at irregular times throughout the day but we do not have volunteers there all

day long. Surely one of those times will work with your schedule.

Every New Volunteer will receive an “Informational Package” by e-mail and every volunteer must have an Orientation, provide their paper work to a crew lead at the farm (not only on line), and read the required material. Orientations are scheduled on a one by one basis. Children under 16 must be supervised by an adult. If 16 or older, the young person must have written permission to volunteer and be a very responsible young adult. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays: Volunteers are there at various times between 8:00 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. (Fridays start at about 10:30 a.m.) We have morning, late afternoon and evening crews on these days. BUT we do not have volunteers there throughout the day.

Tuesdays and Thursdays: Volunteers start arriving in the afternoon, clean their row or two and then others come later after work to finish up. Again, flexibility is the key to caring for the dogs and kennels.

Saturdays: Volunteers start coming anywhere from 10:30 a.m. (or earlier). If you are with a group, please make sure we know your group plans on coming out (see above). Also, Bob could use help loading and unloading dogs for the adoption outings.

Sundays: We never seem to have as much help on Sundays as Saturdays. All the above for Saturdays holds true for Sundays except they start a little later.

Remember, the dogs depend on us. We are all they have until a forever home is found for them. Won't you consider giving them a little part of your week – just a couple of hours or so? The dogs would love you for it and so would we! Hope to hear from you.

New Kennel Guidelines

Because we are concerned about the safety of all including the dogs, we are putting some new guidelines in place. Actually they are not totally new -we just need to make sure everyone abides by them.

1. No one under the age of 16 may walk on the LONG trail without the presence of a parent and without explicit permission from a crew lead. Any exception to this can only be made through the crew lead.
2. Children under the age of 16 may not be left along at the shelter to walk dogs at any time. A parent must be with them, helping them get in and out of kennels and making sure they know how to handle the dogs. Very experienced volunteers are

the exception. Again, this is at the discretion of the crew lead. It is not wise to have youngsters running in and out of kennels or up and down the aisles for obvious reasons. It just gets too chaotic and causes the dogs to become too rambunctious and excitable not to mention noisy. Please make sure you read the attached guidelines for walking if you have not already and read them to your children.

3. Groups that come to help walk dogs need to make sure that there are enough adults to supervise the young people at all times. Please stay with them and help them get the dogs in and out of kennels, leash them properly, follow the walking precautions/ rules and stay safe – dog and child.
4. If you groom the dogs, PLEASE put all grooming tools back where they belong AFTER cleaning all the dog hair off the brushes and combs.



Dean seemed real laid back and independent at first but he is definitely opening up more each day and getting comfortable. He is pushy about attention and super attached to me. (Which makes the sharing the love seat with him and Daisy difficult sometimes!) We've taught him to give paw and to sit. And he is becoming more mischievous in his comfort as well. Which is cute and manageable. So, we have ourselves a winner!! I'll send more pics as time goes on. (Though Dean seems to be camera shy!)




